1) Summary

The Acronym Institute for Disarmament Diplomacy (AIDD) is a UK-based not-for-profit civil society organisation with United Nations consultative status through ECOSOC. With international reach based on over twenty-five years of work on ecofeminist security approaches and alternatives to militarism, nuclear and inhumane weapons, AIDD provides research, ideas and practical strategies to promote and strengthen humanitarian security and disarmament agreements, climate protection, environmental sustainability and inclusive approaches to enable the full engagement of women in building peace, human rights and security for all. AIDD's Board of Directors, personnel, and institutional arrangements in 2022 remained essentially the same as in 2021.

During 2022, AIDD's core funding was from the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust (JRCT), including a portion of the JRCT collaborative grant with UN House Scotland and UNA-UK for coordinating British-based outreach and education on the UN Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW). Additional funding from the Nuclear Education Trust (NET) contributed to the production, printing and dissemination of our major report Nuclear Weapons are Banned: What does this mean for Britain? These grants were restricted to charitable, humanitarian and educational purposes, as can be seen from the detail provided in AIDD's 2022 Annual Report.

AIDD's main work in 2022 was meetings, research and analysis on building peace and security, promoting nuclear disarmament and implementing existing treaties. Much of our work focusses on the nexus between militarist objectives, the production and use of various weapons, and climate destruction, recognising also how gender based violence specifically and disproportionately affects women and girls.

Inevitably AIDD's work has been dominated by the invasion of Ukraine by Russia in February 2022. Tens of thousands have been killed so far in the war, in which President Putin has issued nuclear threats and violated International Humanitarian Law and authorised or condoned attacks on cities, sexual violence and torture of civilians and prisoners of war, and the forcible removal of Ukrainian children to Russia. Our work has focussed mainly on preventing nuclear weapons being used, given the dangers posed by over 12,000 nuclear weapons possessed by Russia and NATO, and the potential for the smaller nuclear-armed states China, India, Pakistan and North Korea to get involved. While not ignoring the deeper causes of this brutal war and post-Soviet legacies of violent nationalism in Russia and Ukraine, AIDD's funded work in this area focusses mainly on implementing and strengthening international humanitarian laws and disarmament agreements.

AIDD raised awareness through our materials and participation in meetings, webinars and media, with emphasis on the humanitarian and proliferation dangers inherent in beliefs and practices of 'nuclear deterrence', the risks of crisis escalation and nuclear war through military-political miscalculations and mistakes, and the nuclear dangers inherent in deploying, threatening or using any nuclear weapons, whether or not such weapons are designated 'small' or 'tactical'. We have raised concerns with governments and parliamentarians about the dangers of widespread nuclear contamination caused by nuclear power operations, military attacks or destabilising military or unmanageable environmental conditions involving nuclear facilities. As well as continuing to highlight the catastrophic impacts of nuclear explosions, war, radioactive contamination and nuclear winter, AIDD takes forward TPNW obligations and works with indigenous and local people harmed by nuclear-related activities such as mining, production, testing, deployments and waste.

AIDD's continuing strategic and governance responsibilities with the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) intensified in 2022. AIDD Executive Director Rebecca Johnson and Scottish Outreach and TPNW coordinator Janet Fenton (who plays important roles in various civil society networks as well as AIDD) engaged closely with UN House Scotland (UNHS, directed by AIDD Board member Gari Donn) and London-based UNA-UK to coordinate UK-based partners and TPNW-related networking in Scotland, the rest of the UK, and across wider European and international civil society and parliamentarians. From August 2022, AIDD was chosen to chair ICAN's International Steering Group (ISG) with Dr Johnson and Dr Donn taking on time-consuming formal roles during the ensuing year.

In August 2022 AIDD received a much-needed three year core grant from JRCT to support our ongoing work on nuclear weapons and encouraging UK and other governments to implement nuclear safety, humanitarian and disarmament agreements, including the TPNW, the NPT, and the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty (CTBT). As well as encouraging more work on the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals on disarmament (SDG 16) this grant supports further work on UN Security Council Resolution 1325 (2000) on Women Peace and Security (WPS) and SDG 5 on gender equality, along with SDG 11 (safe cities) and SDGs 13, 14 and 15, relating to climate change and initiatives for sustainable, healthy and biodiverse life on earth.

With this follow-on grant, AIDD's Board Member Marie-Claire Faray has taken forward her WPS initiatives with COMMON CAUSE UK, who founded the DRC Centre for Women Peace and Security in 2021. With her leadership, this collaborative project is going forward with civil society and diplomatic initiatives opposing gender-related violence and 'small arms and light weapons' (SALW). The project aims to develop more effective legal and diplomatic measures to support women and girls in DR Congo, where the lives, rights and safety of women and girls have been undermined by gangs that use violence to control networks that traffic in various kinds of SALW, as well as mining, rare minerals and people, particularly women and children. In the first four months of this new WPS project the DRC Centre has trained several Congolese women to conduct field research, data collection and interviews with women and girls who are affected by conflict-related violence in the DRC.

The three-year grant also enables AIDD to take forward our work to promote alternatives for real security by challenging nuclear-military-industrial drivers of climate destruction and armed violence, tackling all uses of explosive weapons, and engaging with affected communities and women to bring about just and sustainable security outcomes. In

conjunction with this, it enables AIDD to continue our work with meeting, researching, writing and publishing analyses on humanitarian security, disarmament and climate action.

The sections below give more details, including listings of media and major meetings in which AIDD organised, spoke and significantly contributed. Notably, AIDD's work generated coverage in the *BBC*, Channel 4, Al Jazeera, Sky News, Top Congo Radio and TV in DRC, Associated Press, IDN (InDepthNews/Interpress UN-related media), and articles published by OpenDemocracy, Rethinking Security, Bella Caledonia, the National, and disseminated through various podcasts and webinars.

2) Nuclear disarmament and implementing existing treaties

In January 2022, on the first anniversary of the TPNW's entry into force, AIDD published Dr. Johnson's substantive 175 page analysis on the TPNW, CTBT, NPT, fissile materials and related international, NATO and British security and disarmament challenges, titled Nuclear Weapons are Banned: What does this mean for Britain? This report was produced with research and editorial support from the Nuclear Information Service (NIS), CND, AIDD's former Board Member Tim Caughley (retired NZ ambassador and UN director in Geneva) and other scholars and practitioners.

Having played a major role coordinating the International Campaign to Abolish Nuclear Weapons (ICAN) from 2009 onwards (following ICAN's launch in 2007 as a project of the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War in Australia), AIDD has continued to serve in strategic and governance capacities for ICAN. In conjunction with these networks as well as our AIDD roles, Gari Donn, Rebecca Johnson and Janet Fenton engaged with young scholars and climate activists to develop their understanding and skills to work in this field and make connections related to preventing nuclear dangers and climate destruction. Janet, who also serves as Secretary of the Scottish Parliament's Cross Party Group (CPG) on Nuclear Disarmament, has played significant roles in disseminating AIDD's TPNW research and publications to Scottish parliamentarians, community groups and international civil society.

In August, ICAN's International Steering Group (ISG) chose AIDD to serve as ISG chair until August 2023. In fulfilling these governance and coordination responsibilities, Rebecca Johnson, Gari Donn and Janet Fenton shared the workload, which included the international recruitment and hiring (in August 2023) of a new ICAN executive director to take international TPNW campaigning forward for the next challenging years.

In the run-up to the first meeting of TPNW States Parties (1MSP), AIDD hosted or spoke at a number of meetings relating the 'Nuclear Weapons are Banned' report and the proliferation-driving policies of Russia, NATO and other nuclear-armed governments, including the UK, which are currently opposing the TPNW. In advance of the first meeting of states parties, AIDD submitted a working paper taking forward this report, titled 'Ways to strengthen international security and pursue nuclear disarmament using the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons', published by the United Nations as TPNW/MSP/2022/NGO/33.

Following the TPNW meeting in June, Covid and other problems meant that AIDD was only able to participate in the last week of the NPT review conference in August. Nonetheless our briefings and work on the NPT and TPNW generated substantive media and presentations in fora such as the Asser Institute, Chatham House, Pugwash and the Normandy Peace Initiative's P4 consultations among experts and diplomats from Britain,

China, France and the United States, among others. AIDD also contributed to activist meetings, with emphasis on resisting new deployments of nuclear weapons at Lakenheath, war, climate destruction and global insecurity.

3) AIDD work in Scotland

Janet Fenton has continued to work closely with AIDD Board Member Dr Gari Donn on TPNW-related outreach with parliamentarians, organisations, youth and students in Scotland. Janet Fenton played a key role in drafting and taking forward Bill Kidd MSP's Motion S6M-02639 in the Scottish Parliament: on the NPT and TPNW. The debate in the Scottish Parliament went forward without a vote, noting the calls from civil society groups for the UK Government to uphold its commitments to Article VI of the NPT and to engage constructively with the TPNW, including 1MSP in Vienna.

In February, Janet Fenton organised and moderated a special meeting of the Cross Party Group on Nuclear Disarmament to discuss the Russian invasion of Ukraine, and enabled input from a key grassroots feminist expert working with women's groups in Ukraine to brief MSPs on the unfolding crisis. During the year Janet updated her UK chapter for Reaching Critical Will's briefing book for the NPT, and participated in Scottish Government Approach to a Feminist Foreign Policy consultation, as well as writing the narratives for the film 'A Guided Tour of the Unacceptable'. In working through AIDD's global reach while also developing the 'Secure Scotland' network, it has been possible to do broader outreach to increase understanding of Scotland's unique context and challenges along with AIDD's work connecting global security, disarmament, climate action, and women, peace and security research and analyses.

4) Promoting women, peace and security - AIDD's project researching impacts of war-related violence in D.R. Congo

In August 2022, AIDD received JRCT funding to take forward our long-standing support for women working for peace, justice and security with a new project of research and policy input, led by Marie-Claire Faray and COMMON CAUSE UK, who founded the DRC Centre for Women Peace and Security in 2021 and are establishing training as well as field work in Kinshasa and Eastern Congo.

In the first four months of this AIDD support project from August 2022, the DRC Centre WPS has been able to recruit local volunteers to further promote as well as contextualise the Women Peace and Security agenda, and to train them to conduct field research, data collection and interviews with women and girls who are affected by conflict-related violence in the DRC. Several trainings and workshops were provided to Congolese women and men, in Kinshasa, during the 16 Days of activism to address Violence Against Women.

Promotion and contextualisation of the Women Peace and Security Agenda was made through Popular Radio and TV program, in the DRCongo and online through Congolese Diaspora TV Channel (French, Lingala and Swahili)

In conjunction with the field research, the DRC Centre for WPS functions as a community centre and resource, providing various services as well as activities to build the intellectual, practical and economic capabilities of women and girls whilst also undertaking research and analysis into conditions on the ground and generating policy options for decision makers, diplomats and civil society to take forward WPS Prevention and Recovery objectives.

In addition, the DRC WPS Centre has been developing a Special Crisis Unit, with a holistic approach that provides a listening service and space for women or girls affected by psychological, physical or sexual violence. In this regard, the DRC WPS Centre collaborates with local churches and NGOs, and can offer referral to the relevant services and institutions such as the Legal Unit or the Sexual Violence Management Unit of the National Police or, alternatively, specialised services offered by NGOs in Kinshasa.

Examples of the capacity-building training and projects that the DRC WPS Centre has provided to Congolese women and girls in 2022 include:

- Information and training to end violence against women and girls (VAWG);
- A library of resources;
- Research and analysis, including through consultancies;
- Translation and interpretation of questionnaires and materials into relevant languages, including French, English, Swahili and Lingala;
- Entrepreneurship (e.g. sewing workshops, horticulture, agriculture);
- Arts and crafts, including sewing and basketry;
- Environment and Healthcare, including wellbeing, hygiene, nutrition, cooking, sport.

It is hoped that as this DRC WPS project develops, we will contribute to further unwrapping and understanding the specific as well as general impacts of armed conflict and the proliferation of SALW on the human rights, safety and security of women and girls in DRC and other war-impacted regions.

5) MEETINGS, EVENTS AND MEDIA IN 2022

This section on meetings and events covers non-routine meetings, roundtables and events, notably with AIDD chairing or speaking on issues that take forward AIDD areas of work. Unless in-person venues are specified, these meetings were convened on zoom or other electronic meeting systems. In general this list does not include routine meetings or events that were just attended by AIDD personnel as part of our wider disarmament, peace, intersectional feminist and security issues but not in a main organising or speaking capacity. For that reason, though AIDD personnel frequently attend events hosted by CND, Scottish CND, Secure Scotland, Million Women Rise, Women in Black, Greenham and XR-related networks, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF), the UK Campaign to Stop Killer Robots (CSKR), International Network on Explosive Weapons (INEW), Control Arms, International Action Network on Small Arms (IANSA), and the Middle East Treaty Organisation (METO), ordinary meetings of such organisations are not listed here unless AIDD played significant roles in organising or speaking.

From August 2022 AIDD was elected administrative chair for ICAN's International Steering Group (ISG). As a member of ICAN's ISG, AIDD has legal, administrative and strategic responsibilities under Swiss law. In addition, having originally established ICAN's main Geneva-based legal entity in 2010 and served as ICAN's first president until 2014, Dr Johnson now serves as ICAN's Secretary. Chairing ICAN's ISG greatly increased AIDD's workload, especially for Rebecca Johnson, AIDD Board member Gari Donn, while Janet Fenton focussed on supporting TPNW-supporting organisations and parliamentarians in Scotland. The most significant of the additional ICAN-related meetings are covered below but we have not listed all.

In the period August-December 2022, Marie-Claire Faray furthered the partnership of the DRC WPS Centre with the STEM women's networks in the DRC as well as the coordination of Women in Research and Development (WR&D) of the University of Kinshasa. She is also working to increase collaboration with the Women's Commission of the Federation of Congolese Enterprise, and the Consultant Women Clinic at Kinshasa's Ndjili General Hospital, which serves the large areas of Ndjili, Masina, Kimbanseke, Matete, Nsele and Maluku.
